What skills will I gain from studying Photography?

A Level Photography at Hazelwick is a practical course giving you the opportunity to explore and create work in a range of photographic styles and media including both digital and analogue processes. Digital editing, lighting and studio photography and working in the darkroom are all part of our exciting curriculum. Experimentation and creativity are encouraged, and emphasis is placed upon personal development and tailoring a creative pathway to suit each individual.

Having studied Photography what opportunities will be open to me?

Entry requirements

5 GCSEs at grade 4 (GCSE Art or Photography is not essential)

Exam Board – AQA Specification code/no. - 7206

Topics covered in Year 12 and Year 13

Foundation Skills - An introduction to the course - a series of workshops/projects designed to develop core skills in both digital and analogue photography.

Terms Two, Three and Four: Personal Creative Enquiry - Coursework Unit. With guidance, students develop a self-directed, in-depth body of work and final outcomes, through research and experimentation, related to a self-selected theme. The Personal Creative Enquiry constitutes 60% of the overall A level grade.

Terms Five and Six - Externally set assignment: Students respond to an externally set exam paper offering a range of creative starting points. Again, with guidance, students develop a self-directed, in-depth body of work and final outcomes, through research and experimentation, related to their chosen theme. The externally set assignment constitutes 40% of the overall A level grade
