
















News and Activities from the Geography Department....



All of these resources will be very effective to help the students revise in the future.








Flowers and Pollination




Breathing


Yellowstone National Park, Wyoming

Extreme pH and temperature levels



Yellowstone National Park has may volcanic hot springs. The pH, temperature and chemical content of these pools vary widely, offering a perfect habitat for many different microbes. These microbes survive by eating the chemicals (sulphides, methane and hydrogen) in the lake. An extremophile that lives here is the archaea, which can survive living in almost boiling water









Great Salt Lake, Utah



The Great Salt Lake in Utah is extremely salty! It is so salty that most fish cannot normally survive there. The amount of salt in the Great Salt Lake is about ten times more than the amount of salt in the sea. However, these extreme conditions are what encourage specific salt-loving microbes to stay there, such as archaea and algae. These microbes are what support brine fish and brine flies, which, in turn, provide a food source for millions of migrating birds.

Extremophiles that live here include

algae and brine flies (acalyptrate flies)

Teachers in the Spanish Department have been offering Zoom lessons this term as an alternative to online lessons. Collectively in our department we have many years of teaching experience amongst us, so we have particularly enjoyed the challenge of learning a new teaching skill!

Students from all year groups have been invited to attend our Zoom lessons and we have been learning how to adapt our usual classroom activities and methods to suit this new way of teaching. Year 12 students have not only had weekly Zoom lessons but have also been able to continue their Spanish conversation lessons through Zoom and have even had a Zoom A level mock speaking exam.




News and Activities from the Heads of Year 10....

Careers Café...

In this section of the newsletter, we bring students, parents and carers information on careers and the world of work.

Monthly Key Skills Focus

Each month this year, we will focus on a different employability skill. These are the skills that you need for the world of work – and they're pretty important for life as well! By developing employability skills, you will improve your chances of getting a job and thriving in your career. There are lots of different ways to develop them – including in lessons or extracurricular activities at school, in a Saturday or holiday job, doing projects in your own time or work experience.

This Month's Skill: Leadership

While it's important that you can work well as a team, being able to show you would make a good leader or manager is an employability skill that will set you apart from many candidates. Even if you are going in at an entry-level job that doesn't involve any line management responsibility at the moment, that could change in the future, particularly if you do well at work and impress the boss. Examples that show off your ability to lead include being captain of a sports team, leader of a club or group, or volunteering as a team leader or mentor.

Virtual Work Experience

Last month we had a focus on Virtual Work Experience. Building further on this, 30 Year 12 students participated in a week long programme run by Young Professionals at the end of June. The week was packed full of workshops, business challenges and opportunities to try new things out/build their skill sets. Many global/FTSE 100 companies such as RAF, PwC, EY, Capgemini and IBM were involved in the week, facilitating webinars and workshops.

The Experience included the following:

- ♦ Introduction to the business world (working in the corporate environment)
- Employability skills (CV writing, STAR exercise, the whole recruitment process explained in full detail to big brands) (Digital Interviews, Psychometric Testing etc....)
- Business challenges around emerging technologies, new products and innovation/change strategy
- Projects to work on in their assigned groups and mentors to monitor progress
- Prizes and office experience days were given to stand out students during the week
- Each student received their own digital log book so they could keep track of their progress.

All students that took part in the full week received a written reference from Young Professionals that they can include on their CV's and make reference to the global companies they heard from.

The WSCC Careers Team can provide practical help, information, advice and guidance to young people who are transitioning from school or college and find that their exam results are not as expected. The team of careers advisers will be happy to take telephone calls or respond to emails during this period and offer individual guidance on exam results day. During the Covid-19 lockdown period they continue to offer careers guidance and support to young people by telephone, text, social media, email and skype.

They can support young people to:

- assess what they want to do next
- * recognise their skills, strengths and ambitions
- * find out about opportunities, including education, apprenticeship, employment, traineeship, further training and volunteering
- * develop a plan to help achieve your goals, and keep on track with that plan
- * create a CV, practice interviews, search for jobs and complete job or benefit applications.

Spotlight on Safeguarding...

For your information this month, via the Newsletter, we are raising awareness of the issue of children managing change as they transition to a new school year or to their next step in life.

As young people start their summer holidays they begin the most uncertain transition to the next academic year or stage in their life than any generation in recent memory. Under normal



circumstances some children who are about to begin secondary school, move to the next academic year or start their GCSEs will find the transition more difficult than others. The Mentally Healthy Schools website states that children may find managing changes more difficult, for example, if they have a special educational need or disability (SEND), a mental health problem or previous experiences of being bullied. Due to the coronavirus pandemic more young people across different age groups will be struggling with managing changes. Jacqui Campbell, director of the Julian Campbell Foundation, has said that teenagers that

face major life-changing transitions with exams, moving into further education, university or work are particularly vulnerable to the uncertainty caused by the pandemic. The changes to the structure in young people's lives has been altered and Campbell has discussed how at a time when young people should be "more independent," they are in fact spending more time with parents and carers at home and that this has "raised stress levels" in a number of young people. Lee Hudson, chief of child mental health at Great Ormond Street Hospital has revealed that in a study some young people have been overeating to cope with low moods during lockdown

It is important then that young people are able to use the summer break to improve their physical and mental health in preparation for their next step in life. The mental health charity YoungMinds offers a parent helpline on 0808 802 5544 and the charity Mind offer emergency support and self-help tools if parents are struggling. In terms of family life, a recent study by Guy's and St Thomas's Charity and Bite Back 2030 have found that more families are now eating together and a majority of young people feel this has had a positive effect on their health



and wellbeing. YoungMinds have suggested other practical steps for when children head back to school. The charity states that you should provide your child with as much information as possible about the new school day as this will be different to what they are used to. Mind have suggested "empowering" young people by encouraging them to do things such as exercise with family or on their own, beginning journaling as a way to "process their thoughts" and also mindfulness.
