WHAT DO MEXICANS WEAR?

The most popular and well-known women's pieces of clothing in Mexico are huipil, quechquémitl, rebozo, Mexican skirts (they have various names in different regions – enredo, chincuete, posahuanco, refajo, enagua), Huipi is a sleeveless tunic, made from cotton or wool. It is worn with a skirt. There are three primary types of Mexican clothing. There is daily clothing which varies according to profession and economic class but in general consists of slacks or jeans with a button-down shirt or T-shirt for men and a skirt or slacks with a blouse or T-shirt for women. Then there is traditional Mexican clothing, which varies by region but often includes shirts made from natural fibres such as cotton and agave, shawls known as rebozos (which are also wrapped and used to carry babies), leather cowboy boots and, for men, sarapes, or big blankets wom over the shoulder for warmth. Finally, there is ceremonial clothing worn for indigenous dances, cultural festivals and other special occasions.



WHAT DO MEXICANS EAT:


Mexicans drink lots of milk, like salty foods more than sweet foods, Mexicans drink lots of milk, like salty foods more than sweet foods, eat an average of 6 fortillas every day, and have a traditional domestic dict soup, rice and stew, without leaving out salsa and beans, 94% of Mexicans eat lunch every day, followed by 78% for breakfast and only 64% for dinner. Chocolate, The Maya's "food of the gods," made from the toasted, fermented seeds of the cacao tree, is arguably the New World's greatest gift to civilisation. Though Cortez learned of chocolate from the Aztecs, the Maya ate it many centuries earlier and used cacao beans as currency. Vanilla, The elix from the world's only known edible orrothio driginally flavoured Maya chocolate drinks. Southern Mexico's jungle is the only place the orchid grows wild, pollinated by native stingless bees that produce Maya honey. The prized Tahitian vanilla, from Mexican stock, must be hand-pollinated. Chiles, Chiles, Chiles have been cultivated in the Americas for more than 6,000 years. Blame Christopher Columbus for calling them "peppers," but credit him for their worldwide reach. Southern Mexico's Capsicum annur species, with its many cultivars, is crucial to nearly every fiery cuisine.



WHAT DO MEXICANS CELEBRATE/CUSTOMS?

Mexico is a country rich in heritage and traditions. Thus, it is no wonder that Mexicans celebrate a wide array of holidays over the course of the year. Given the predominance of the Catholic faith in the country, many celebrations are religious in nature, with large-scale festivities taking place around Christmas, Easter, and other occasions in the Christian calendar. However, Mexico also has many festivities which are unique to the country, including Dia de Muertos, as well as civic and statutory holidays. This is a guide to the diverse holidays that take place in Mexico year-round.






The Year 9 GCSE students have been busy developing their rendering skills and drawing techniques. They have been practicing isometric drawing with and without grid paper.


For their rendering skills, they have drawn 2D products and used Pro Markers and fine liners to enhance the images to give an impressive 3D effect.



Midnight Sun by Stephenie Meyer



This title has yet to be added to the Accelerated Reader scheme.




The World's Worst Parents by David Walliams






Dare to Be You by Matthew Syed


Picture Books



How the Stars Came to Be



Book Buddies Group



Spotlight on Safeguarding Continued...

For your information this month, via the Newsletter, we are raising awareness of the issue of revenge porn.

In the last year, the UK's revenge porn helpline has dealt with more cases than ever before. There has been a 22% rise in cases on last year with experts predicting that the increase could reach 60% by the end of 2020. In a Sky News report, the manager of the helpline, Sophie Mortimer, suggested



that this rise was triggered by the Covid-19 lockdown. Revenge porn is the sharing of private sexual materials, of another person, either photos or video, without their consent and with the purpose of causing embarrassment or distress. Approximately two thirds of the cases reported involve women. There has also been a rise in sextortion cases, which involves the practice of extorting money from someone by threatening to reveal evidence of their sexual activity. Revenge porn is not just a crime aimed at adults, children are sadly also targets. Guardian News has reported that over 500 children were victims of revenge

porn last year. A further concern is that 360 suspects were also children and young people. This reveals the extent of the problem whereby children are committing acts of revenge porn, while also being victims of it. Whether many of these children are aware that revenge porn is a criminal act and that it can lead to a criminal conviction is not clear.

Maggie Bradford of the NSPCC has stated that students should receive lessons that teach about the right of people to have "dignity and respect" and that "consent is as important in the digital world as it is face to face" At Hazelwick School, revenge porn is already taught as part of the PSHE

curriculum and in Years 8 and 10 students are taught how this differs from sexting in regard to the legal ramifications. In terms of the support available, unfortunately the national helpline for revenge porn is only for adults over the age 18. However, young people can contact Childline's phone and messaging service up until the age of 19 for support and advice on a range of topics including revenge porn. Young people and adults can also make a report on the CEOP (Child Exploitation and Online Protection Command) website. CEOP is part of the UK's National Crime Agency and works to combat the online



sexual abuse of children. After an incident is reported, the child protection team at CEOP will then be in contact and look at ways to make the young person safe. To request a child abuse image or video to be removed from the Internet, you can anonymously contact the IWF (Internet Watch Foundation) and they will have this content removed.
