News, Events & Activities... Black History Month

October was Black History Month and Hazelwick students took part in a variety of activities in order to celebrate this.

Within History lessons students in Years 7 and 11 have been studying the rich and varied history of the UK and beyond. Students in Year 7 looked at a variety of key figures such as Mary Seacole and Martin Luther King before studying the Mali Empire of the 14th-17th centuries in more detail. Students in Year 8 have been studying the African slave trade and have completed some brilliant homework projects on the role of Black British Abolitionists in ending slavery. Students in Years 9 and 10 have been studying Elizabethan England so they had lessons looking at Black Tudors, including a musician for Henry VIII. Finally, Year 11 History students have been studying the fight for Civil Rights in the USA so they have spent time this month, in addition to this, finding out about the Bristol Bus Boycott - an ultimately successful, 4 month refusal to use the buses in 1963 in order to protest against the Bristol Omnibus Company's refusal to employ Black or Asian workers.


In the wider school community there have been quizzes, a chance to complete creative projects to celebrate Black History Month and a poetry competition too.

News, Events & Activities... Year 9 Sociology







Grace Saif graduated from Hazelwick in 2013 and went on to study acting at The Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts, one of the UK's most prestigious drama schools. Grace offered her insight and skills to the Sixth Form Drama students, leading them in a workshop to explore their use of movement and voice in monologue performances. Grace, who has gone on to achieve success in seasons 3 and 4 of '13 Reasons Why' introduced herself to the group of Year 12 and 13 students by saying "I started my drama career in this very drama studio, on this black floor, surrounded by these walls", thanking Hazelwick for the opportunities it provided her and the wonderful performances she had both seen and taken part in here.

Grace explored the physicality and range of movement in the back, using yoga moves to encourage flexibility and movement in the spine, before moving on to the importance of the breath. Students worked on prepared monologues that they could use for their forthcoming drama school auditions. Grace ended the day with a Q and A session and stayed for a few obligatory selfies! Donations for Crawley Open House






Year 12 3D Design










3D Design



In this section of the newsletter, we bring students, parents and carers information on careers and the world of work.

Monthly Key Skills Focus

Each month this year, we will focus on a different employability skill. These are the skills that you need for the world of work – and they are pretty important for life as well! By developing employability skills, you will improve your chances of getting a job and thriving in your career. There are lots of different ways to develop them – including in lessons or extracurricular activities at school, in a Saturday or holiday job, doing projects in your own time or work experience.

This Month's Skill: Numeracy

The ability to understand and work with numbers is important in virtually any job. We use maths every day to understand facts and figures, make decisions, and solve problems.



You don't just use your numeracy skills in maths and science. Subjects like art and design and IT are all about solving problems and making plans based on the information you have at your disposal.

Do you have a part-time job in a shop? Or get pocket money? If the answer's yes, you almost certainly use your numeracy skills to tot up the amounts, or put cash aside in your savings.

Crawley Virtual STEMfest

Crawley Virtual STEMfest ran from 12th to 21st November. Students were able to access a virtual careers fair, watch videos of employees describing their skills and work and participate in a range of activities, both in form time and in lessons.

These activities supported our students in their learning of CEIAG (Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance) and towards the school's progress on meeting the Gatsby Benchmarks.

We were also informed on the application processes for each of the schemes and the requirements needed. Overall, I would say it was really enlightening and would highly recommend it to my peers. "

Careers in Tech

In 2019 the role of software developer was one of the top 5 sought after roles across UK cities, amongst key worker roles such as Nurses and Social care workers. This shows the importance technology plays in the UK economy. Digital tech skills and roles are becoming increasingly critical to businesses across UK sectors, as well as multiplying with the growth of the tech sector.

Some information:

- Advertised roles in the digital tech sector have grown 36% since June
- Sector advertised over 90,000 jobs per week in August 2020
- Tech employs more than a fifth of workforce in UK's biggest cities
- UK tech employs 2.93m people, with 40% growth in two years
- Median digital tech sector salary increased by 4% from 2018 to 2019
- Digital tech now accounts for 9% of UK workforce
- Bristol has seen highest salary increase across digital tech roles in 2019 from £35,520 to
- The demand for Cloud computing has grown by 22% from 2018 to 2019
- London is still a salary sweet spot for digital tech workers, with the median salary across all digital tech roles at £55K
- Software developer is the most in demand role sought by employers and makes up 6% of all advertised digital tech roles

Read On!



I wanted to share with you my favourite reading-related websites as they provide a wealth of information and reading support to a wide range of readers, including adults. The Reading Agency envisages 'a world where everyone is reading their way to a better life'. At the core of the Agency is the belief that reading can help with the challenges of life, including mental health and social mobility via their range of partnership programmes. In addition to their 'Chatterbooks' and 'Summer Reading Challenge' for children, I thought I would highlight some of the programmes aimed at adults. Last year, Hazelwick students took part in the 'Reading Friends' programme, which aims to tackle isolation by bringing reading groups together. We met with a group of visually impaired adults at Crawley Library and there was some very lively discussion about the books we had all read/listened to.

The National Literacy Trust aims 'to give disadvantaged children the literacy skills to succeed in life' by working with schools and community groups. In additional to supporting parents/carers, the Trust also undertakes research into literacy rates and campaigns to raise awareness about the importance of literacy. I have also included some websites that are both excellent if you are looking for book recommendations.

Working with a team of health professionals, this programme centres on five different booklists that aim to support and increase the understanding of a range of conditions, including mental health, long term conditions and dementia. Working with reading groups and different categories of readers, this scheme aims to provide recommended titles that will uplift the spirit and includes non-fiction and poetry, in addition to fiction titles.

Quick Reads

This programme was launched in 2006 and aims to provide access to a range of books for 'those who may find reading difficult as they are a perfect entry point to reading for pleasure.' The Reading Agency teams up with well-known authors to write six short titles that will engage emerging adult readers. The Reading Agency has a strong partnership relationship with adult learning groups, colleges, public libraries, hospitals and prisons to ensure that the books are easily accessible and can be purchased at bookshops for $\pounds 1.00$. Over 4.8 million copies of over one hundred different titles have been distributed since the project began. When you consider that one in six adults in this country find reading difficult, having a range of quality contemporary titles written especially for emerging adult readers is important.

The future of the project looked doubtful when the project could not secure funding but the author Jojo Moyes saved the day by funding the project for three years. The selection this year is excellent, Candice Carty-Williams has written a retelling of 'West Side Story' which has a carnival setting. Adam Kay's funny and very honest memoir has been adapted. The author Milly Johnson pens a tale about a life changing hen party and the crime fans will meet A.A Dhand's I Harry Virdee for the first time. Fanny Blake has edited an anthology of short stories from well-known authors Ian Rankin, Sophie Kinsella and Adele Parks.

Fantastic Fiction

This is one of the sites I use most often. In addition to checking out the reading order of popular series and the dates for new publications, the site is excellent for discovering the most popular authors by genre. Books for children and young adults are also included but please note the site only includes fiction titles.

In addition to the adult version of the site, there is also one tailored for children with searches made by age range. In addition to book reviews, the site has a wealth of book related activities, including author readings, poetry readings and art projects. I am sure that students will enjoy the poll section of the site too, where they can vote for their favourite Harry Potter book!

Opening the Book

'Opening the Book' was created by two small companies, one based in the UK and one in the States, specialising in library design and library staff training. They also operate the 'Whichbook' website. This is a book search site with a difference, it allows the reader to search for books by mood and emotion, using the sliders. Once you have made your selection, you can read a very brief summary of the story and an extract to give a flavour of the writing style. You can also search by character and plot or use the world map to select by country. The site is really useful if you have just read a bestseller and want to read something similar. For example, if you have just finished reading 'The Mirror and the Light' by Hilary Mantel or 'Girl, Woman, Other' by Bernadine Evaristo, clicking on the book cover in the bestseller search will give a list of titles written in a similar vein.



Most podcasts are free and cover a range of subjects and interests. See below for the link to the research article.



The first form to reach over 1 million words read is; 7MOW. Fantastic team effort 7MOW!





Spotlight on Safeguarding Continued...

For your information this month, via the Newsletter, we are raising awareness of internet security for young people.

Many parents and carers worry about the online activity of their children and the harmful impact it can have on their wellbeing. Ofcom reported in 2019 that fewer parents feel that the benefits of their child being online outweigh the risks compared to five years ago. This anxiety for parents/carers over what is happening online with their children is well founded when considering that 2 in 5 students have never told anyone about the worst thing that has happened to them online, according to a 2018 report by Digisafe. The known harms for young people going online can be daunting, ranging



from inappropriate pictures, grooming and gaming addiction to scams and false news. The myriad of apps for young people to download can also be of a concern as there are many new apps which are not commonly understood of by adults. A new video, voice and chat app called **imo**, which is similar to Whatsapp, uses your location to connect to people close by, including people you do not know. Due to this, NetAware believe that it is only suitable for people over the age of 18. There is also a new gaming app called **amino** which also allows for online chat and for young people to join forum discussions about the games they play. However, there have been a number of reports of inappropriate sexual messages being sent to children through this app. **Yolo** is an anonymous

question and answer app used within Snapchat which became the most popular app in the US and UK within a week of its release in 2019. Similar to other anonymous apps, it could encourage users to send malicious messages or allow for cyberbullying. The app itself has changed its age rating to 18, so it is not appropriate for children. Finally, there is a live streaming app called **Omegle** which sets up video chat to strangers. There are no safety features for parents and carers plus the user has no control over who they talk to so this is an app that should be avoided for children.

There are a number of ways that parents/carers can be in control of what their children are able to do online. Parental

control apps such as Google's Family Link are ideal for managing the apps that your children can have access to, as you are notified that your child wants to download an app and then you can either approve it or block it. However, Google Family Link will not block inappropriate content within the app so you would need to check the settings on the app itself. OurPact works in a similar way and like many other apps it allows you schedule time limits for the apps your children are allowed to use. Well known Internet security brands such as Norton and Kaspersky also offer parental control apps. Having location services turned off or on is also an important consideration. On the one hand it is possible that the child's live location can be visible to strangers on their phones and apps if settings are not changed. However using location services are also useful for parents/



carers as they can track their child's movement from home to school and when they are out and about.

Enhancing and broadening your knowledge of your favourite subject is always enriching in itself, as well as providing helpful additional knowledge and perspectives for your GCSE or A level course.
