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	 If the school becomes aware that a student or a staff member has tested positive for coronavirus, the school will contact the local health protection team. The team will carry out a rapid risk assessment to confirm who has been in close contact with the person, and these people will be asked to self-isolate. To help with this, records will be kept of: The students and staff in each group, including the classroom seating plan. Any close contact that takes place between children and staff in different groups. This is in accordance with timetabled lessons of students, as well as their year group social area. Close contact means: Direct close contact – face-to-face contact with an infected person for any length of time, within 1 metre, including: Being coughed on, A face-to-face conversation, or 	School will work with the local health protection team to decide if additional action is needed, such as student or staff member is admitted to hospital as a result of Covid-19. The School is no longer required to undertake routine contact tracing in school.

All staff and students will continue to follow the measures set out in this risk assessment, regardless of their participation in rapid testing. We will ask students and staff to share all test results with us, and we will keep accurate records of all results. We will only share health records with the relevant people, in line with GDPR regulations. We will report test results to NHS Test and Trace wherever this is required by current government guidance.
