



Year 7 Thermometer Project


Year 7 have recently been introduced to their LCD thermometer project. They started by learning about smart materials and evaluating existing products.

As a class they generated their own clients who were then assigned at random, so that their design process replicates a real-life design process. This then helped to inform their design ideas which are all individual and based on their client's interests and needs.

You can see the start of some thoughtful design ideas with annotations, which will then be cut out on MDF using tools such as coping saws and decorated using acrylic paint.



Year 12 and Year 13 Discussion Groups

The Year 12 and Year 13 Discussion Groups offer our Sixth Formers the chance to broaden their knowledge of current affairs, discuss social and moral issues, as well as developing sensitive listening and debating skills.

Throughout the last term, the new Year 12 students have impressed me with their ability to listen carefully to one another as well as articulating their own viewpoints considerately. We discuss an eclectic range of topics! This year so far we have considered issues such as: to what extent should social media be responsible for the material placed on its platforms?; why are we, as individuals, not doing all we can to prevent the worsening of the environmental crisis?; are 12-15 year olds capable of making their own decision about whether to have a Covid vaccination?; should MPs be allowed a second job?; to what extent should an individual put the needs of society above their own needs?



Iffat Rahman also led an insightful discussion on the topic 'to what extent should the police be allowed the power to 'stop and search'? and Tarkan Ates facilitated a discursive debate about whether the legal drinking age in the UK should be lowered to 16 (most students in the group believed it should not be!)





Careers Café...

In this section of the newsletter, we bring students, parents and carers information on careers and the world of work.

Monthly Key Skills Focus

Each month this year, we will focus on a different employability skill. These are the skills that you need for the world of work – and they are pretty important for life as well! By developing employability skills, you will improve your chances of getting a job and thriving in your career. There are lots of different ways to develop them – including in lessons or extracurricular activities at school, in a Saturday or holiday job, doing projects in your own time or work experience.

This month's Skill: Problem Solving

Problem solving is part of everyday life, and we face problems from the moment we wake up to the moment we go to bed.

Employers rate problem-solving skills highly, so you need to demonstrate that you have them, but if you've never had a job, how can you possibly know how to solve problems at work?



Problems come in all shapes and sizes, from how to cross the road to how to overcome an obstacle. At school, you're probably most familiar with problems from maths: 1+x=3, so what is x?

This is an easy one (clue: the answer's 2), but even so, you have to think about the information you have, what it tells you, and how you can use it to get to the answer. And this is the essence of all problem solving: travelling from A to B using logic to get there.

At work, you might face all sorts of problems, and here are just a few:

Making the best of your time

So you've got your algebra homework due for maths, your composition for music and an essay deadline coming up for English. What do you do?

You prioritise, of course. You look at what's due in first, how long each piece of work is going to take you, and make a plan to make sure everything gets done on time. Balancing all the projects and tasks you have on the go is something you'll have to do every day in many jobs.

Learning and adapting

Remember when you were trying to learn the periodic table and it just wouldn't sink in? You couldn't for the life of you remember whether it started with the helium or hydrogen. You realised that you weren't getting anywhere and that you needed a technique to help you – so you learn the Elements Song!

Well, working out where you're going wrong and coming up with a strategy to get around it is a great problem-solving skill. If you can demonstrate this ability to an employer, they'll know that they won't have to sit with you for hours on end explaining the same thing over and over again.

Working things out

This is hardcore problem solving – often called critical or analytical thinking – and it's this kind of thing that employers really love. This is especially true if you're going into a career where you'll have to solve problems as part of your day-to-day work, such as a games development, engineering, or medicine.

If you're a doctor and a patient comes to you with an ongoing headache, they want you to do more than just give some painkillers and send them on their way. You'll need to find out where the pain is, what kind of pain it is, what other symptoms the patient has, as well as a whole host of other things which will help you work out what is causing the headaches, how urgent it is, and how to treat it.






New Year, New Books!

The Tale of Peter Rabbit by Beatrix Potter




After refuelling, we returned to Hazelwick, hopefully inspired by the experience.

Spotlight on Safeguarding...

For your information this month, via the Newsletter, we are raising awareness of how safe Tik Tok is for young users.

TikTok enables users to view, make and share videos to millions of users worldwide. The age rating for the app is 13, which is common for many social media apps. However, many children under 13 regularly use TikTok.



One of most concerning trends amongst TikTok users are 'challenges' whereby a TikTok user will create a challenge for others to copy. Whilst there are many harmless challenges involving dance moves, there are a number of challenges which are dangerous and have caused injuries and even deaths. For example, the skull-breaker challenge involves two people kicking the legs away from a third person, making them fall over. This has led to serious injuries in teenagers copying the challenge and has led to prosecutions in the United States.

A more recent issue has been the use of TikTok to abuse others. The BBC reported that online learning resources created by teachers featuring themselves during lockdowns have been used by some students to target them with online harassment.

At Hazelwick School, assemblies on e-safety are delivered by the Head of Computer Science and IT to Year 7, 8 and 9 students. Students also study e-safety in both IT and PSHE lessons during Year 7.
