


YEAR 10

Our GCSE Food Preparation and Nutrition students have been developing their GCSE practical skills by learning how to make fresh pasta.

















Dare To Dream Workplace Visit

On Monday 6th June the Dare to Dream Project reached its finale with a workplace visit to Gatwick Airport. A group of students were invited to attend Gatwick with their mentors to see the world of work, behind the scenes.

During the visit we toured the airfield by coach with permission from the person in charge of all airside areas, escorted by the special vehicles they have to alert air traffic control of vehicles crossing the runway. We saw the huge airbus land and went past where air traffic control is based. We saw all the stand points for all the aircraft and visited the fire station. The fire crew at Gatwick provide a vital service and deal with medical emergencies there too. We then saw the £12, 000 000 fire plane be ignited and extinguished and heard all about the training regimes they put in place to plan for disasters and incidents.

Staff at Gatwick volunteer to role play being injured and trapped on the fire plane to help the fire service plan how to deal with these situations in case they ever occur. They do the same in the terminals as well. We then got into the fire engines and put out the fires using the jets that are controlled from inside the vehicle. After this tour we then went into the control rooms. Here there are multiple huge screens with every CCTV angle covered of the terminals and surrounding areas. In addition, there are cameras out on the runways that see for two miles in every direction as well as drone detecting technology for a 5km radius around the airport.

It was fascinating to see the people at work, carefully monitoring all that goes on for the smooth running and overall safety of the airport. Their shifts are very long but with continual breaks to make sure they stay focused and alert to any possible incidents. The communication skills required to work in the control centre were obvious to see; every part of the airport has to communicate with each other. There are thousands of passengers every day, so this is very serious and important work.

A huge thank you to the mentors from Gatwick Airport who have guided our students over this programme at school and who made us feel welcome, with a goody bag to take home too!

Monthly Key Skills Focus

Each month this year, we focus on a different employability skill. These are the skills that you need for the world of work – and they are pretty important for life as well! By developing employability skills, you will improve your chances of getting a job and thriving in your career. There are lots of different ways to develop them – including in lessons or extracurricular activities at school, in a Saturday or holiday job, doing projects in your own time or work experience.

Business Skills: What They Are and How To Develop Them At School

Business skills are relevant to you because they can help you work effectively for any employer – whether they are a profit-making company, a charity or even an organisation in the public sector. Business skills are highly sought after by employers, who look for employees who are savvy and understand what it takes for an organisation to be successful in today's world. They are also vital if you plan one day to start your own business – which research suggests most young people want to do or would seriously consider. Some business skills that are particularly useful are:

- Commercial awareness
- Customer service
- Financial management
- Leadership
- Marketing
- Negotiation
- Networking
- Project management
- Sales

You use many of these skills across your school subjects. For example:

- Leadership: If you have ever worked in a team or group in PE, drama or any other subjects, you may have taken the lead in suggesting a strategy or course of action. Can you think of an example of when you took the initiative and suggested a particular tactic or action plan in a group activity?
- Marketing: In design and technology, you may have worked on a product design project, thinking about how to make the product appealing to its audience and how to advertise this to potential customers. Can you think of a time you did this? If not, can you think of how you might have highlighted aspects of your product to persuade potential customers to buy it?
- Project management: Whether in art, history or a science subject, any time you have worked on a big project at school, you will have had to plan ahead, considering the deadline and any work needed to create a high-quality piece of work within that timeframe. Can you think of an example of an independent project you have worked on to a deadline?

Read On!

There is a dedicated manga fanbase at Hazelwick School and I have promised students that I would purchase new titles to add to the manga section of the library. I thought I would use this opportunity to feature the manga section of the library and highlight some of the popular manga series. In addition, the winners of the Yoto Carnegie Greenaway Awards and the Women's Prize for Fiction were announced recently so I thought I would share the names of the Medal winners with you.

Marvellous Manga!

Manga is an umbrella term for the Japanese style of comic book and graphic novels, aimed at both adults and children. The artwork is traditionally in black and white, with full colour used only for special releases. Manga is the Japanese word for 'cartoon.' Manga books are divided into five main categories, which reflects the target audience. Kodomoomuke is aimed at younger children, with Shonen and Shojo aimed at older children and teenagers. Seinen and Josei manga titles are aimed at adults, and this is reflected in the themes. As the books are designed to be read from right to left and the panels need to be read in the correct order, I have provided the link to Walker Book's handy guide on how to read manga books.

There is a skill to reading manga books and they are a prime example of multimodal literacy. Multimodal formats convey meaning to the reader through a combination of visual images, written language, and spatial design. Examples include graphic novels, picture books and textbooks. Digital multimodal formats include film, web pages and digital stories. As we live in an increasingly multimodal world, it is important that students have access to a range of multimodal formats. There are many plus points to reading manga. Firstly, they provide a wide range of themes. In addition, fans of series reading are attracted to the multi-volume nature of manga. Readers will learn to 'read' the facial expression of the characters to understand mood/emotions. They will also learn inference from the illustrations and other pictorial clues that are not mentioned in the text. I recommend them to reluctant readers as a 'stepping stone' to chapter books. If the student enjoys the horror or fantasy elements of the story, I can then suggest chapter books on a similar theme. Manga readers discover the range of artistic talents of the illustrators and often design their own manga characters.

Popular Manga Series



Bleach by Tite Kubo

The 'Bleach' series has an interesting mix of characters and is a fantasy/horror crossover about a boy that can see ghosts. When central character Ichigo meets a Soul Reaper, his abilities are enhanced, and he soon becomes a Soul Reaper too.

Please note that this series does include characters smoking and some fantasy violence.

Dragon Ball Z series by Akira Toriyama

This is a popular fantasy series which features demons, aliens and saving the world! This the follow up series to the original 'Dragon Ball' and sees the central character mantle handed over from father to son in terms of the plot. There are twenty-six volumes in this series, and there are several follow-on series to keep the 'Dragon Ball' fans happy. This series is aimed at Key Stage 3 & 4 students and does contain some fantasy violence.



Manga Shakespeare series - various illustrators

This series adapts the major Shakespeare plays into manga format and often changes the setting of the story. For example, in 'Twelfth Night,' the setting is changed to a steampunk-inspired 19th century. In 'As You Like It,' the forest of Arden is transposed to modern-day China. Reluctant readers enjoy the different presentation of the plays.



My Hero Academia series by Kohei Horikoshi

The combination of a school setting with superheroes explains the appeal of this series. Central character lzuku knows that he is one of the twenty per cent of the population that was born without superpowers and will never be able to enter the 'Hero Academy,' the famous school which teaches students to harness their powers. Izuku's life is completely turned upside down when he makes a chance meeting with a superhero who changes Izuku's destiny. To the best of my knowledge, there are thirty-four volumes in the series and there are also several spin-off series.




The winners were announced on the 16th of June and unusually for the Carnegie Award, the same author won both the Yoto Carnegie and the Shadower's Choice Medal. Author Katya Balen won with 'October, October' which is the author's second novel and was inspired by the author's father-in-law who lives off-grid. October is the name of the central character, who has spent her childhood living in the woods with her father. October's life is turned upside down when her father has an accident, and she must move to the city to live with her mother. This book has also been listed for several other book awards.

I am delighted that after fifty years of waiting, a graphic novel has won the Yoto Greenaway Medal. Illustrator Danica Novgorodoff has won with her illustrated edition of the book 'Long Way Down' written by Jason Reynolds in 2017. The story is a hard-hitting one about gang violence and revenge. Please note that this graphic novel is aimed at older readers as it contains gun and gangland violence and some strong language.

The Shadowers' Choice for the Kate Greenaway prize was awarded to illustrator Mariachiara Di Giorgo for the book 'The Midnight Fair.' The Women's Prize for Fiction 2022 Winner





Spotlight on Safeguarding...

For your information this month, via the Newsletter, we are raising awareness of the issue of body image and young people.

The amount of screen time children have can be a concern for parents/carers, particularly when deciding on how much and how often. The UK's chief medical officers have advised parents/carers that mobile phones should be banned from the dinner table and before bedtimes and that children should take a break from screen based activities every two hours by getting up and being active. The recommendations include family time

where talking at meal times replaces the use of a mobile device.

device.

There have been calls for social media companies to be more responsible and promote the healthy use of mobile devices. One app, Tik Tok, has created a new feature called 'screen break.'

The tool alerts the user if they have had a significant amount of uninterrupted screen time. Alongside this feature is the 'screen time dashboard' which gives the user information on their activities on Tik Tok including how often the app is opened and when the app is being used, day and night.



When making decisions on screen time, the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health (RCPCH) have published a set of questions which families can use when deciding upon screen time for their children.

- Is your family's screen time under control?
- Does screen use interfere with what your family members want to do?
- Does screen use interfere with sleep?
- Are you able to control snacking during screen time?
