News, Events & Activities from the German Department...

Back in September 2022 links were created between Hazelwick's German department under the supervision of Mrs Brink-Freund and a new partner school in Germany, with the support of its English department's staff members Mrs Meister and Mrs Löffler.

The German school in question is the 'Erich Klausener Schule ('EKS'), a secondary school with about 600 pupils.

According to the school, its teaching and learning approach, as well as modern methodological concepts, make it possible that the joy of learning is strengthened with a focus on promoting and nurturing the students' personal talents. An active school life includes numerous study groups, school events, excursions, class trips and presentations.

The school is located in Münster, in the north-west of Germany.

Since the autumn term 2022, a lively exchange of letters has been developed between 'EKS' students and students of our German classes. This letter exchange involves our German Year groups 7, 8 and 9 who are in contact with 'EKS' students between the ages of 10 and 14.

Not only do students get to use their respective foreign languages in writing, thus using a language skill in a real-life context, but they also get the chance to learn about a different country and culture. Several letters have been sent and received since the launch of the exchange, with students in both schools always being excited to hear from their pen pals.

In the future, it is hoped that joint (digital) projects will deepen this exchange and foster the cooperative work that has been set in motion between the 'EKS' English department and the Hazelwick German department.

Hedgehogs – Our Prickly Friends Under Threat! By Thomas Bullen 7TFR

Hedgehogs are small, hibernating mammals that are native to the UK. They can live for 3-8 years and are omnivorous, with a diet of worms, insects, and berries. Hearing and smelling are crucial for hedgehogs as they have poor eyesight. They are effective in self-defence, as they are immune to adder poison and are covered in 5000–7000 porcupine-like quills which they smear foamy saliva on to repel parasites and make the quills taste horrible to predators. They mostly live in the dense foliage and woodlands of Europe, Asia, and Africa. Their young are called hoglets or piglets, and a group of hedgehogs is known as an array.

Unfortunately, hedgehogs are now vulnerable to extinction in the UK because of hazards like netting and ponds, habitat loss, increasing amounts of traffic and pesticides, which make finding food more difficult.

To help hedgehogs, you can do several things. Here are a few to try in your garden at home:

- Put leaves, compost and sticks in an area of your garden to make a hedgehog nest, not to mention a home for the insects that they like to eat.
- Leave crushed-up dog or cat food out (if you can get hedgehog food, brilliant!) for them to eat, and water to drink. Never leave milk or bread out because they can be harmful or not nutritious enough. Make sure to wash and replenish the food bowls daily.
- Create small holes or tunnels in or underneath fences or walls to help hedgehogs easily get in or out.
- Keep dogs away from them they attack hedgehogs.
- Try your best to avoid slug pellets and pesticides, as they can be extremely harmful to hedgehogs.
- Make sure to check for hedgehogs before lighting bonfires, mowing the grass, or destroying sheds they could be nesting there.
- Make sure your garden is litter-free and clear of pieces of netting.




House News...


Read On!

I hope my article for this month will provide some reading inspiration for the holidays, with my feature about 'Cosy Crime' titles, library challenges, and some book awards shortlists. Thank you to avid reader Amelia Wong in 9MOW for being our final guest reviewer of the academic year. Amelia is a huge fan of fantasy fiction novels and of the author Leigh Bardugo in particular.

Cosy Crime

I must confess that I am a huge fan of the Cosy Crime subgenre, and it has been fascinating to see the rise of Cosy Crime titles in the book charts. Definitions may differ but there are common tropes including an upbeat tone, with a fair amount of light-hearted humour and often an amateur sleuth. The novel's setting is especially important to the plotting of this type of novel. They must have an attractive setting to attract potential victims, so think the quaint rural village, or a holiday destination with scenic views. A closed community is also important to the setting as it limits the suspect pool! Examples include a hotel, a school, a retirement village, or a religious order. Set any of these locations on a remote island for Cosy Crime perfection! Red herrings may feature in any mystery novel but there will be red herrings galore in this subgenre as part of the joy of reading this type of novel is the 'whodunit' element.


These novels are not for the fans of the serious crime thriller, there will be very little 'police procedure,' no deep psychological analysis of the criminal mind or graphic violent scenes. Cosy Crime titles are read for escapism and are often published to tie in with the major holiday seasons. 


Canon Clement Mystery series by Rev. Richard Coles






A Spoonful of Murder by J.M. Hall

This title was published in 2022, and the second book followed in 2023, called 'A Pen Dipped in Poison'. Agatha Christie fans will be reminded of the Miss Marple title 'A Moving Finger,' as poison-pen letters are central to both plots. A third book is due to be published next year. The author is also a deputy head of a primary school, hence the central characters being retired teachers, in addition to being a successful playwright.

The Marlow Murder Club by Robert Thorogood






Death of an Author by E.C.R. Lorac

Lorac is the pen name of the writer Edith Caroline Rivett, who also wrote under the name of Carol Carnac. Rivett was a prolific writer, having written over seventy books from the 1930s to the 1950s. 

Book Title: Book- Six of Crows by Leigh Bardugo








Reading Ambassadors' Book of the Month

Spotlight on Safeguarding...

For your information this month, via the Newsletter, we are raising awareness of the issue of body image and young people.

The consumption of energy drinks by children has been a concern of parents/carers and schools for many years now. Research from 2022 shows that up to a third of UK children are consuming at least one energy drink a week, whilst some are having them almost daily. Energy drinks are marketed as a product that increase

energy and mental alertness. These drinks have become increasingly popular after You Tubers KSI and Logan Paul launched the Prime drink range. Due to limited availability at first, there was chaos in the supermarkets as queues of people were scrambling to get a bottle, which led to the drinks being sold on the black market for considerable amounts of money. There are potential health risks, particularly for children, at a time when their brains and bodies are developing. In May, the Independent reported that a primary school student was hospitalised after drinking Prime Energy, which led to the student needing their stomach pumped. A report from the British Medical Journal states that common issues linked with the



consumption of energy drinks include headaches, sleep problems. irritability and increased risk of alcohol use and smoking. Unsurprisingly, there is a link with worse educational outcomes for those consuming high amounts of energy drinks.

The amount of caffeine in a number of these energy drinks has raised concerns. According to the European Food Safety Authority, a small 250ml energy drink has 80mg of caffeine in it, which is twice the amount of caffeine that you would find in an average sized can of cola. The Prime Energy drink has as much as 200mg of caffeine in and experts suggest that caffeine warnings on the products need to be clearer as it is not clear which of the Prime products have caffeine in and which are caffeine free. Concerns around the Prime product range has led to some schools banning the drinks in school. Students are not allowed energy drink at Hazelwick and these are confiscated if they are brought into school. There is currently a voluntary ban in some shops of sales of energy drinks to under 16s.

At Hazelwick School, the dangers of consuming energy drinks and high caffeine products are studied by Year 7 students in PSHE lessons as part of the RSHE curriculum.


