



News, Events & Activities from the History Department...

History Club!

The Sixth Form History Club has returned for 2023 and Miss Hammans led the first session focusing on the question 'Could WWI have ended in 1916'?

Students pre-read an article from the BBC History magazine written by Holger Afflerbach and debated their ideas in a university style seminar.

We investigated the principles of 'waging war until absolute victory' and the ramifications of this ethically. We explored the 'War Trap' coined by historian David Stevenson, and the idea of greater human losses meaning it became more difficult to accept or consider peace negotiations. Some contemporary historians doubted the wisdom of 'fighting to the finish' because the death toll was so high and a compromise may not be as durable as one dominated by a victory party. We debated the campaign of Philipp Scheidemann, a German Social Democrat who advocated for peace in 1916 but he could not produce any concrete examples of the enemy wanting to discuss peace. On the other hand, we had Lord Landsdowne, a British politician, who originally had voted for British involvement in the war in 1914, but was worried about the collateral damage done to civilisations in Europe in 1917. He was supported by Pope Benedict XV to 'stop the senseless slaughter.'


The session went very well, with lots of historical discussion of peace negotiations and jam tarts. A huge thank you to the following students for making it a success:




In Year 12 Sociology lessons, students have been learning about the 'cereal packet nuclear family' and how the family is seen as so ideal in society it can be packaged and sold.

It's tough being a gir

I have lots of things to share with you this month; reading for pleasure recommendations, reading lists that deal with young people's mental health issues, and our new 'Reading Well' display. I thought I would also take a peek at the books that are topping the bestseller charts for children and young people. Our guest book reviewer this month is Ms Fearon.

Reading for Pleasure

Following on from Mrs Gray's article regarding the importance of reading for students, I thought I would focus upon the different benefits of reading for pleasure and share some resources that parents/carers may find useful.

One of the important benefits of reading for pleasure often gets overlooked, but according to the research undertaken by National Literacy Trust, "children and young people who like to read are three times more likely to have better mental health." They discovered that reading for ten minutes per day is all it takes to experience the benefits of reading for pleasure. Reading was discovered to reduce stress levels in young people, provide escapism, and act as a mood booster. Books provide useful springboards for discussion about mental health issues. One of the BookTrust consultants, Alexandra Strick summarises the importance of the role of books as follows:

"Books can play a powerful role in supporting children as they navigate their way through difficult experiences and challenging times. Children can find stories that gently suggest ways for coping with shyness or anxiety, and books that offer valuable messages of hope or understanding during a significant life change or a family illness. Books can also help them understand the experiences and emotions of others, and so develop their empathy and kindness."

I have shared the link to the BookTrust's mental health and well-being themed booklists as I thought parents/ carers and our students would find it a useful starting point.

BookTrust also found that reading for pleasure increases children's ability to empathise as "Children who read books that offer opportunities to empathise with the characters have increased levels of empathy, especially towards stigmatised groups."

Children who read for pleasure demonstrate increased imaginative and creative skills and the report found that "by constantly formulating and reformulating their expectations of what might happen in a story, young readers practise mental flexibility, an openness to new situations and interpretations and problem-solving." Reading for pleasure also improves physical health, for example the research also reported "Children aged 11-14 who read for pleasure have healthier lifestyles. They are less likely to try cigarettes or alcohol and eat more fruit, irrespective of their family background."

The importance of reading to children and shared reading was also empathised. One of the benefits that I found striking was the findings about children and poverty. "A child growing up in poverty who is read to at age five has a significantly higher chance of economic success in their 30s than their peers who are not read to." In addition, reading for pleasure "has the power to help mitigate socio-economic inequalities such as low family income and educational background." Books can also provide readers with valuable advice and guidance, and can often signpost charities and agencies that offer support. In October 2023, a new 'Reading Well' collection of recommended books for teens was launched. The Reading Well organisation aims to support "the mental health and wellbeing of teenagers aged 13 to 19 years old, providing information, advice and support to help them better understand their feelings, handle difficult experiences and boost confidence in a post-pandemic context." There are twenty-seven books in the collection, which have all been chosen by health professionals. A wide range of mental health and wellbeing issues are covered, including body image, depression, anxiety, neurodiversity, sexuality, and gender identity. Top of the Charts!

With reading for pleasure in mind, I thought I would share some of the books that are topping the Children's and Young Adult Fiction bestseller charts, according to The Bookseller. Bookshops across the country will be filling their shelves with the books that publishers hope will make the perfect holiday gift come the end of the year and top the charts.



Percy Jackson and the Olympians: The Chalice of the Gods

There are a devoted band of Rick Riordan fans at Hazelwick School, and they will be delighted to hear that the author's latest Percy Jackson and the Olympians title, 'The Chalice of the Gods' débuted in the top spot for Children's Fiction; a first for the author. This is book six in the series and sees Percy, Grover, and Annabeth reunited in a bid to help Percy complete three quests so that he can earn the letters of recommendation he needs to enter college. Can the trio complete all three quests in time?



Bunny vs Monkey: The Impossible Pig

Jamie Smart's series has proved very popular with our younger students. I have been recommending them to fans of the 'Dog Man' and 'Investigators' series. Students enjoy the quirky illustration style with bright colours and the over-the-top plots. In this very funny story, new character Pig has gone missing. Will Pig be found, and will the reader discover who or what is behind his disappearance?



The Boy Who Slept Through Christmas

I think Matt Lucas has hit upon a powerful combination for making the holiday bestsellers list – a Christmas theme and songs! Central character Leo wants his first Christmas without Mum to be just right, but everything seems to be going wrong. Leo decides to run away from home, and this is the start of his Christmas adventure. The book includes QR codes to the songs that Lucas has written and recorded to accompany the story.





Impossible Creatures

If you haven't read any of Katherine Rundell's books, please try one as she has an amazing gift with language. Fantasy fans, especially Harry Potter fans, will delight in this tale of mythical creatures, magical and non-magical worlds and the battle for power and knowledge. The story has two strong central characters but for me it is the mythical creatures that steal the show! Rundell writes stand-alone novels, but I hope that 'Impossible Creatures' is the first in the series.



The Phantom Thief

This is the third book in the 'Breakfast Club Adventures' mystery series and a fourth book is due to be published next year. The series was inspired by Rashford's childhood experiences and are written with Alex Falase-Koya and illustrated by Marta Kissi. In this story, an unknown thief is stealing from the different school clubs. Will Marcus and his pals catch the thief before the Art Club exhibition gets cancelled?



Finding Bear


Author Hannah Gold's writing debut 'The Last Bear' received great critical acclaim when the book was published in 2021 and featured on numerous book award short lists. It went on to win both the Blue Peter Book Awards (Best story) and the Waterstones Children's Book Prize (Younger Fiction) in 2022. 'Finding Bear' is her third novel. All of Gold's novels are a celebration of the animal and natural world and our relationships with both. 'Finding Bear' is the follow up to 'The Last Bear' and finds central character April back home a year after her Bear Island adventure. When April hears about the shooting of a polar bear, she decides that she must discover if her bear friend is safe and so begins her Arctic adventure.



Five Star Stories

The popularity of the Tom Gates books does not seem to be waning as this is book twentyone in the series! In this story, Tom is desperate to win an award for a school writing project. Tom seeks inspiration from five objects that include Great Great Aunt Aggie's fake bird hat. Will Tom get his stories completed in time for the deadline and will he triumph over his classmates? Tom Gates fans will love the combination of Pichon's humorous storytelling and quirky illustrations.





Unlike the other titles making up the top ten, this is the only book not to have been published this year. First published in 2019, the 'Good Girl's Guide to Murder' series by Holly Jackson has really struck a chord with older teen readers and critics alike. This novel won the British Book Awards - Children's Fiction in 2020 and featured on the shortlist of several other book awards. Students tell me that they enjoy the many plot twists in this murder mystery and Jackson keeps the reader guessing. Please note that the story contains violence, underage drinking, drug use and references to sexual assault. I have added this title to our Adult Fiction section of the library.

Book Title: A Murder Is Announced by Agatha Christie


On a blustery grey day over half term I decided to scan my bookshelf and revisit an old favourite. I love Agatha Christie, both her novels and her short stories, and A Murder Is Announced is one of my absolute favourites. I'm fortunate to have a first edition of this one, which definitely added to the ambiance of reading with a hot mug of tea as the wind whistled at the windows. I always relish the challenge of trying to discover the identity of the murderer and although I have read this one many times and know the plot inside out, it is always such a joy to read.



The novel begins in the quiet village of Chipping Cleghorn where the main characters are introduced as they read the local newspaper over breakfast. They are all intrigued by a notice that someone has had printed. "A murder is announced and will take place on Friday, 29th October, at Little Paddocks, at 6.30pm. Friends accept this, the only intimation." The owner of Little Paddocks, Letitia Blacklock, is very surprised by this as she knows nothing about it, but she prepares for guests anyway. Sure enough, the neighbours arrive one by one and at 6.30pm the lights go out and a masked man shines a torch into the room. A gun is fired and when the lights come on again Letitia Blacklock's ear is bleeding and the masked man is found dead on the ground. So begins the intricate web of lies and deceit, which Inspector Craddock tries to unravel. The police flounder somewhat until the inspector forms an unlikely alliance with Miss Marple who is visiting the village, striking up conversations with the locals and uncovering a plethora of clues in the process.

What do I think about the book?

The book is set just after the Second World War and the context is important to the plot, I think. I really like the way that Christie creates the feeling of village life in this period and I love that the characters are introduced while they read the local newspaper because it shows us so much about their personalities from the outset. Most of all, I adore the character of the quick-witted Miss Marple who is always at least three steps ahead of any detective.




Who would enjoy this book?

I think that anyone who likes a good mystery would enjoy this book. I first read it in my early teens and it was real page turner because I remember trying very hard to identify the murderer before the end. Reading Ambassadors





For your information this month, via the Newsletter, we are raising awareness of body image and mental health.

With World Mental Health Day featured earlier in the newsletter, Spotlight on Safeguarding is highlighting how a poor body image can impact the wellbeing of young people.

Body image is how we think and feel about our own bodies and how we believe others view us. Young people are bombarded with altered images from influencers online of what are considered to be 'perfect' bodies and research has shown that aiming for an unrealistic body image can create unhelpful attitudes, according to the Mental Health Foundation. Some young people have what is called a body dysmorphic disorder where they constantly worry about flaws in their appearance.

Last year, the Health and Social Care Committee of MPs stated that they want new legalisation to be passed by the government which would mean that if a model's photo on an advertisement has been digitally altered, then a warning must be added to notify people.



The search for the 'perfect' body has led to some seeking procedures which can be dangerous for those under the age of 18. The BBC have reported that beauticians have been advertising dermal lip fillers for cosmetic reasons on social media and offered to carry out the procedure on under 18s, which is illegal. Complications with this procedure include infection, lumps, bruising, scarring and even blindness. More extreme procedures include surgery known as the Brazilian Butt-Lift to attain a similar look to the American media personality Kim Kardashian. A number of young British women have flown abroad to have this risky surgery and have died during the procedure. Boys are also impacted by a negative body image with the Think Tank Credos stating that "boys are increasingly worried about their appearance." Eating disorders, which are usually associated with girls, impact boys as well with research suggesting that 1 in 4 of those with this disorder are boys.

At Hazelwick School, we explore issues around body image, self-esteem and mental health in Year 7 PSHE lessons. This includes introducing students to the idea of body positivity, which is a movement to accept all bodies regardless of type, shape or size. If a young person is struggling with body image issues, they can see one of the school counsellors or contact Childline for support. Childline has a 1-2-1 counsellor online chat service, email service, a message board to share experiences and a Mood Journal to help track mood.


