




News, Events & Activities from the Design Technology Department...



The answer is four.




In mathematics, the four colour theorem, or the four colour map theorem, states that no more than four colours are required to colour the regions of any map so that no two adjacent regions have the same colour.

Ten identical coins are arranged in a triangle.




By moving just three coins, can you make the triangle point downwards?




Congratulations to all that entered our Pi competitions.

Magistrate's Mock Trial Competition...



Going to Guildford Crown Court as part of the school's mock trial team was truly a wonderful experience for us all. We learnt a lot about not only the court system but it gave us an excellent insight into the life of court staff and what happens during a trial at a Magistrates' court.

When we got to the court, we started by interacting with the other schools. Shortly after that, we were led into a court where we had the opportunity to question a panel of individuals, each with distinct, important roles within the justice system. This included lawyers, magistrates, detectives and others. We were then allowed to go into the area of the court where those in custody are held. This was quite the experience as we were handcuffed, allowed to sit in prison cells and even understand what it's like to hear the cacophony of prisoners banging on the cell doors!

Then, of course, we had some trials to compete in! The courtroom setting was intimidating - a must have experience for anybody considering a career in law. Whether playing the part of a lawyer, witness, magistrate, court clerk or usher, our confidence grew as we performed our roles! After it had finished, we all wanted to be able to do it again!

The case in question concerned an alleged assault by a passenger on a taxi driver. Witnesses were called to give their evidence; lawyers asked them questions 'in chief' to get them to tell their story, a story that was then 'cross-examined' by the other side. Magistrates had to listen to the evidence that was presented to the court in order to make their eventual decision and the legal adviser and usher ensured that the law was correctly followed. Everyone did really well and while we did not win the competition, we received very encouraging feedback from the judges about our performance.

If you are a Year 8 or 9 student next year, I definitely recommend you audition to be part of the team. Every moment was not only helpful and informative but great fun. We all bonded so much and there is an incredible difference between how we were at our auditions to the way we performed at the actual trial.

Birdboxes!




This year, everyone had the opportunity to make amazing birdboxes in the design technology department. We made them from scratch and with help from Mr Baigent-Scales.




Paper Aeroplane Results




Tolá Okogwu






Frances Hardinge




Sibeal Pounder


Fantasy Fiction for Older Readers

Lauren Roberts



Book Title: Midnight Library

What do I think about the book?

All she has to do is select a book and live that life, everything from being a mother, wife, rock star, Olympic swimmer, arctic researcher and everything in between. Attendance and Punctuality...

Good attendance and punctuality are vitally important for all students from Year 7 through to Year 11. Hazelwick School ensures that all its students receive a full-time education that maximises opportunities for all students to realise their true potential. The school recognises that punctuality and regular school attendance are essential to social inclusion and integral to effective learning and academic progress.



To achieve and maintain high levels of attendance and make the most of the opportunities available at school, it is important that students follow the steps below:

- Attend school everyday
- Arrive to school by 8.25am and to be settled in their form rooms by 8.30am
- Take holidays and family visits at weekends and during school holidays only
- Stop the use of electronic devices at a reasonable time in the evenings and to get a good night's sleep to be able to wake up efficiently in the mornings
- Access online resources for support if needed, including the school website's wellbeing page for advice on mental health and to speak to their Head of Year team if there are any concerns
- Attend school and make use of the school's medical block if feeling slightly unwell in the mornings, rather than missing the whole day
- Use travel apps to plan journeys ahead when travelling to school; the Metrobus: Sussex, Surrey, Kent app and Google Maps app can provide live bus trackers, bus timetables or information on road traffic

Did you know?

- Students with no absence are 3.1 times more likely to achieve GCSE Grade 5 or above than students who missed 10 15% of all sessions
- Students with no absence are 2.2 times more likely to achieve 5+ GCSE grades 9-4 including English and Maths, than students who missed 15% 20% of KS4 lessons
- Of students with absence of 50%, only 3% managed to achieve 5 or more GCSE grades 9 4, including English and Maths

Parents and carers are asked to contact the school by 8.30am on each day of their child's absence. When a student's attendance becomes a significant concern through accumulated unauthorised absences and unauthorised Leave of Absence requests, a referral to West Sussex Pupil Entitlement Team for consideration of a Fixed Penalty Notice or court action could be made.




Spotlight on Safeguarding...

For your information this month, via the Newsletter, we are raising awareness of a national programme called Cyber Choices which encourages young people to make the right choices online.

Cyber Choices is a national programme co-ordinated by the National Crime Agency. The programme aims to

help young people to understand the law and to make informed decisions. The website the programme is delivered through, offers guidance to young people through a number of case studies showing how they could be breaking the law under the Computer Misuse Act (1990). For example, imagine if a young person watches a friend entering their username and password and remembers the log in details. Then without permission, they log in and read all the messages. This is unauthorised access to computer material and against the law. Examples such as these are discussed in videos



available on the website. There is also advice on careers, training, and apprenticeship opportunities in tech related industries to highlight the potential possibilities for young people who engage in computer technology positively and legally.

For parents and carers, the programme raises awareness of the fact that many are unaware of their child's activities online. The average age of arrest for cybercrime is just 17 years of age and a number of young people will be committing cybercrime unknowingly. There are a number of resources available on the Cyber Choices website which can help facilitate discussion between adults and children about online activity and also about the range of opportunities available in the cyber world. 
