St. Catherine's Hospice Youth Enterprise Challenge 2024

On 25th April Mr Croft and Dr Khambata attended the presentation of the awards for the St. Catherine's Hospice Youth Enterprise Challenge Project. Awards were made in a number of categories; the most prestigious being the award for the highest amount of money raised. I am delighted to report that, for the twelfth year running, the Hazelwick team of Matilda Beard, Cameron Taylor, Madie Beard, Lily Rutledge, Eliza McCarthy and Chloe Nobbs won this award with the absolutely incredible total of **£9310.58** (inclusive of Gift Aid). This is a truly amazing result; their target was £1500, so to exceed that by over £7,500 is phenomenal. The students have worked incredibly hard showing total dedication and commitment to raising as much money as they could.

The total raised by the 5 schools participating in the Youth Challenge was £20,601.00.

The team organised a number of major fund-raisers, including a non-uniform day, a fun run, bake sales, a car wash and a culture day. The CEO and staff at St Catherine's Hospice were full of praise for the commitment that our students had shown. We are immensely proud of these students; they are an absolute credit to our school and deserve every praise for their incredible efforts.

YEAR 10

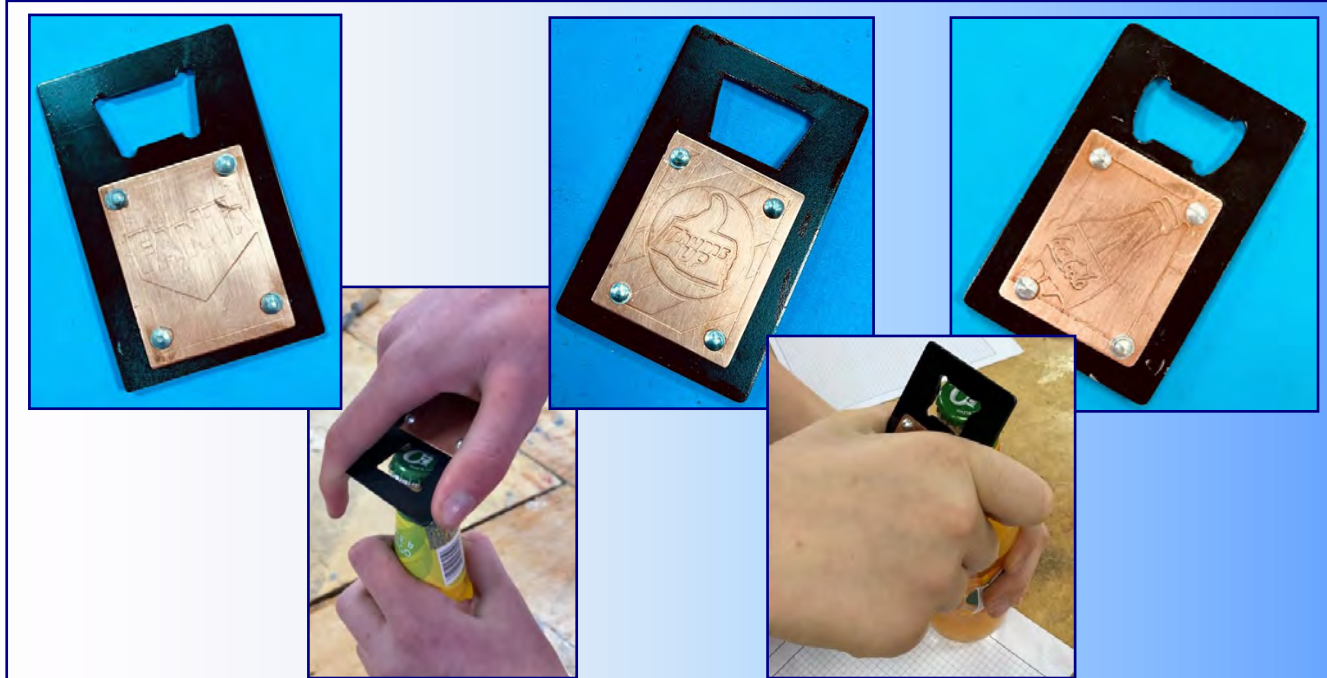

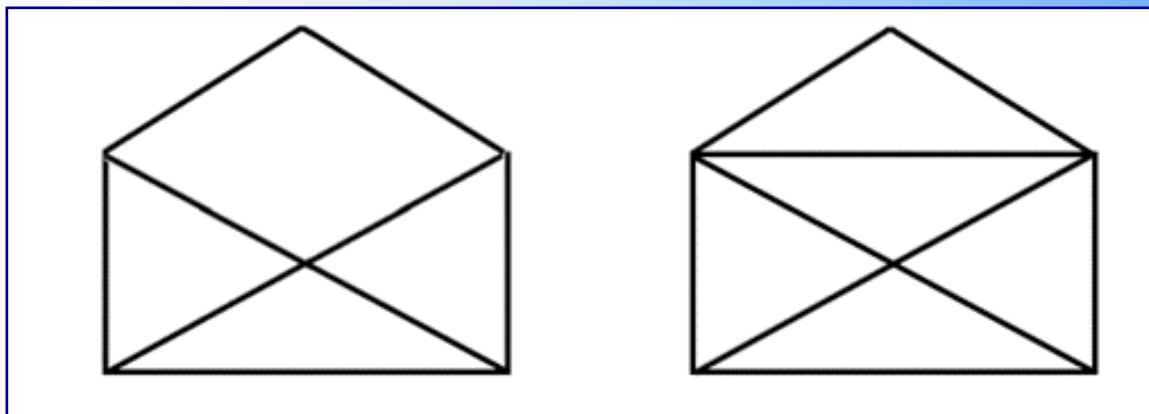

Student Robotics 2024

Student Robotics challenges teams of 16 to 19 year-olds to design, build and program fully autonomous robots to compete in an annual competition. After announcing the year's game, the teams are given just six months to engineer their creations. This year Hazelwick went all the way to the finals at Southampton University, at the end of the Easter break.

This year's Hazelwick team was lead by Hayden Muggeridge, in Year 12, and he and the team should be proud of their achievements.

The competition started with the teams being given a design brief at the Student Robotics Kick Start event back in October. This year's challenge, based around 'Space, the final frontier', was to build a robot to collect asteroids and return them to their own planet. Simple? Maybe not as simple as it sounds. It's crowded in space when other robots are after the same resources and there are thieves and saboteurs to contend with too.

The team had to go through a full design process from understanding the needs of the competition, through generating ideas, prototyping, testing and modifying, before finally having a robot ready for competition.

Being autonomous the robot required a significant amount of programming, and this took a great deal of dedication from the team leader with assistance from others. Support for this was also given by volunteers from Student Robotics and on top of the weekly in school team sessions two technical days were also attended in Horsham and at the Raspberry Pi Foundation, in Cambridge.

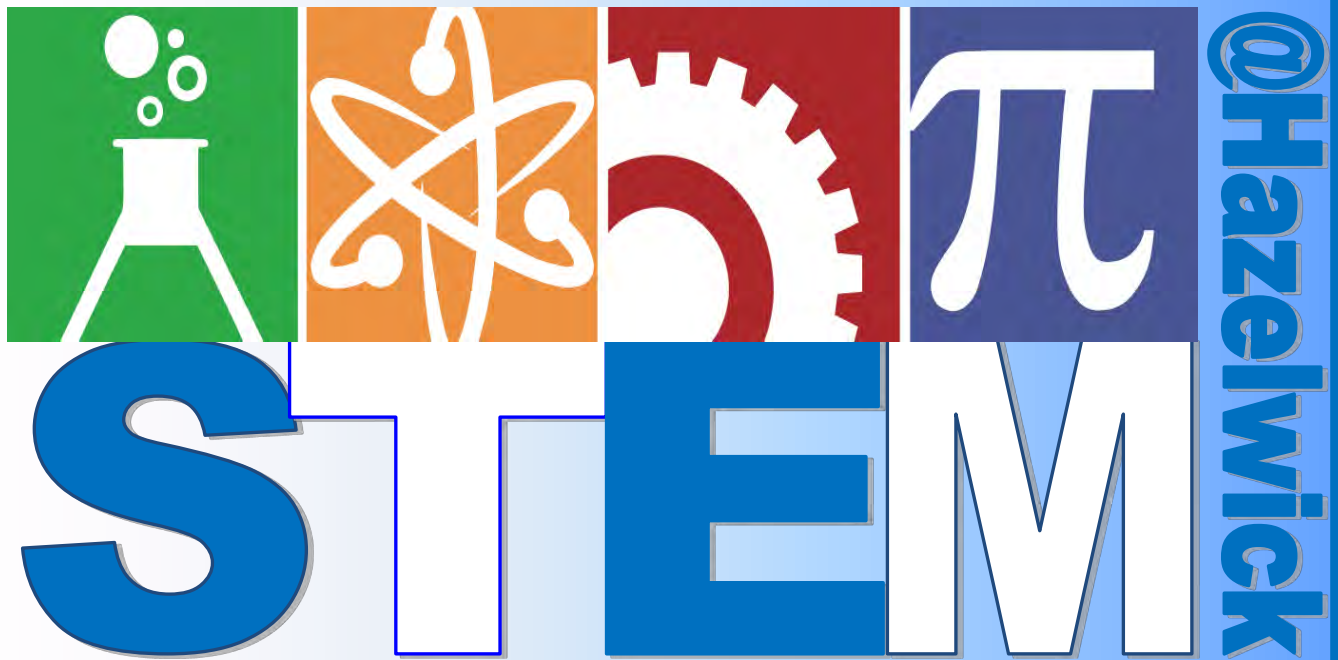


In competition testing

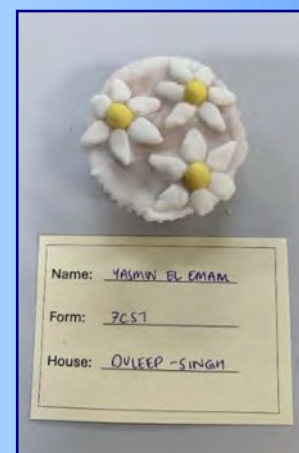
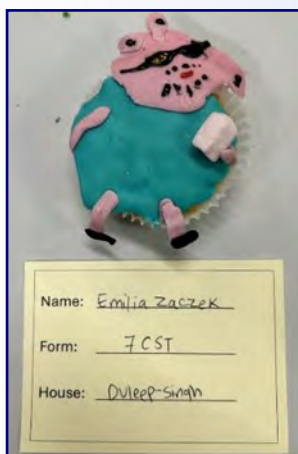


The Great Hazelwick Bake Off

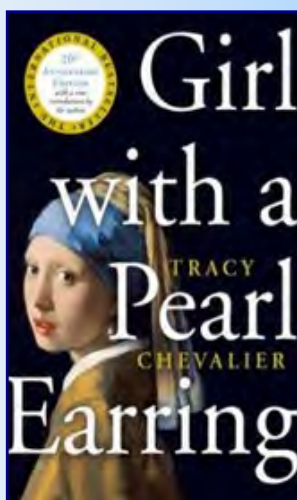
Book Title: Girl With A Pearl Earring

Author: Tracy Chevalier



This short Adult novel tells the story of 16-year-old Griet in the 1660s. She goes to work as a servant in Delft which is in the Netherlands where she cleans, does laundry by hand, shops and babysits for the family of painter Johannes Vermeer. The main story line of the book is centred around the origin of a real-life famous painting called Girl With A Pearl Earring, but it is a completely fictionalised account. Very little is known about its painter, Johannes Vermeer, so the author imagines how the painting came about. I love this story as it touches on many different themes which all make you think about your own life, especially the difference between life in the 17th century compared to life today. It describes what family life was like, how relationships between the wealthy and the poor were structured and just how hard-working life was for servants. They worked such very long hours at difficult manual tasks, with few days off and for very little money. It also tells the story of power, who has it and who doesn't. I also love how the book touches on the chemistry of the paints used to produce works of art and the terrible devastation of infectious disease at that time - it makes me truly glad to be alive in the time of modern medicine.

One of my heroes, Antoine Van Leeuwenhoek and his famous camera obscura also features in the story. I enjoyed this book so much I made a point of visiting The Hague in the Netherlands where the real painting is displayed. I feel very lucky to have seen it as it is extraordinarily beautiful, the white paint used to depict the pearl earring is so simple but effective. It is so wonderful how the writer describes the seemingly straightforward brush stroke used to produce the pearl. Girl With A Pearl Earring isn't really a happy tale but it will make you want to visit Delft and The Hague to see Vermeer's work for yourself. There are some scenes where the young people are not treated very well and so I would recommend it for older students.

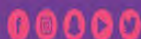

Spotlight on Safeguarding...

For your information this month, via the Newsletter, we are raising awareness of a National Crime Agency (NCA) alert to schools about the dangers of sextortion.

At the end of last month, the NCA sent an unprecedented alert to all schools about the dangers of sextortion. Sextortion is defined as the criminal activity of online blackmail, whereby criminals will threaten to release sexual imagery of a victim unless they are paid money or another financial demand such as purchasing a pre-paid gift card. This action by the NCA was prompted by a surge in the number of cases worldwide with the aim of guiding teachers to support young people who may be targeted. The US National Centre for Missing and Exploited Children state that between 2022 and 2023, worldwide reported cases of sextortion jumped from 10,731 to 26,718. Older teens are mostly at risk, with boys being targeted in particular between the ages of 14-18. While it is rare, the sextortion of young people has led to cases of self-harm and suicide. Scottish teenager Murray Dowey (pictured) tragically took his life last year after criminals pretending to be a girl tricked Murray into sending them compromising pictures of a sexual nature and then blackmailed him. The following morning, he was found to have taken his own life.



NCA advice for parents

- **Chat regularly about their life online.**

Take an interest in their life online. Explore new apps and websites together. Talk in a balanced way, considering the benefits and potential harms.

- **Talk about where to find information about relationships and sex.**

Use guidance on age-appropriate advice topics from reputable sources such as CEOP Education, Childline and Brook. This will be helpful for your child to understand sexual communication, image sharing and what unhealthy relationships look like, including applying pressure and blackmail.

- **Review privacy settings.**

Talk to your child about the importance of using privacy settings.

- **Make sure they know where to go for support.**

Talk to them about being able to speak to you if they have concerns and if not then make them aware of other trusted adults or sources of support, if they feel they can't talk to you, such as Childline.

- **Make sure they know where to report.**

Ensure your child knows how to report an incident to the police or how to use the CEOP Safety Centre [CEOP Safety Centre](#). It is important to also make them aware of how they can get a nude or semi-nude image removed from the Internet using the Remove and Report tool from Childline and the Internet Watch Foundation. 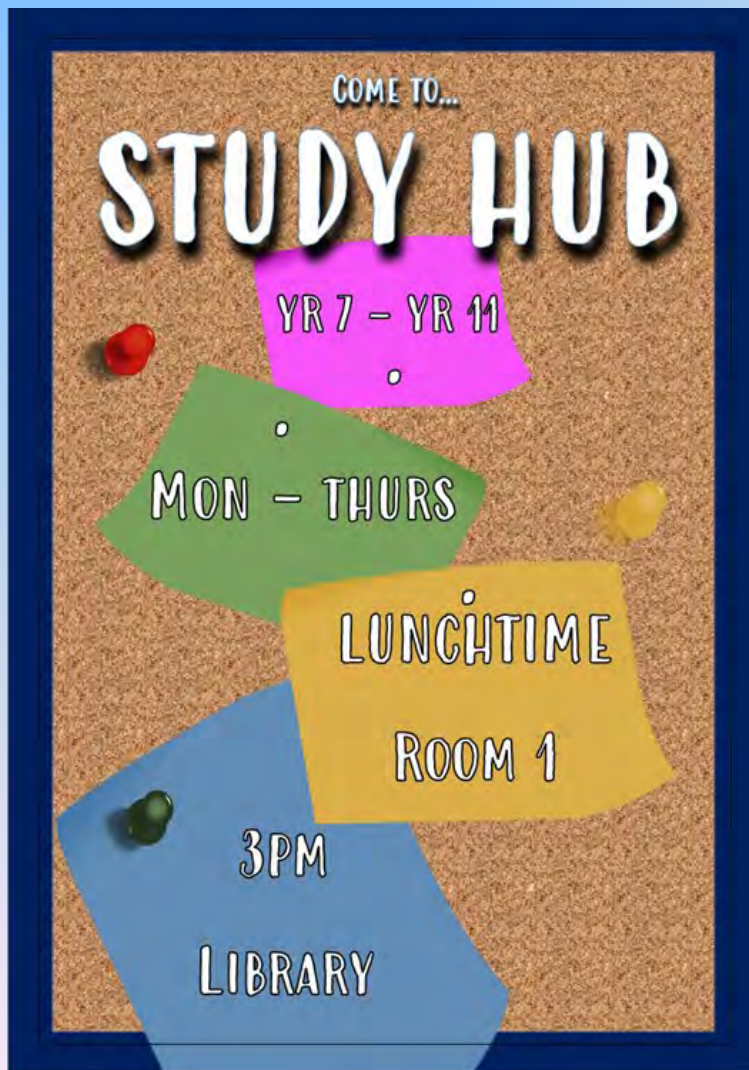
